
We can't forget to mention Cindy Perazzo [our Provincial Coordinator of the PCM Province] who was 'in at ground level' to help with the success of this adventure.

'Let shine' is from the Greek word, '*lampó*' meaning to shine; to give light.


How fitting a constellation of isolated members in North America reveals a symbol of light and hope.

There seems to be a point in being asked to 'suffer', 'offer up', or 'accept the Cross'. As Carmelites we seem to 'train' in areas of suffering and a theology which encourages us to be used by God, in living with a sense of rugged acceptance, quiet resignation, and surrender to 'God, Jesus, Our Blessed Mother, or patron saints of Carmel'.

Historically, we have been a movement to enter a desert, a quiet sanctified place of prayer and contemplation as opposed to becoming hospital founders, education masters, or even great authors of theological tomes leading the Church into insights of growth, sustainability, and new direction of our commitment to Carmel.

Of course, one of the observable signs of the charism of our promises as members of Carmel is the underlying example of change, introduction of reforms, changes in how we interpret our vision, and even a better understanding of what it means to be Carmelites in this age, in this place, and this world.

Since May of this year I have been a little 'out of whack' in my lovely retirement home, working in homes for the elderly, writing and seeking out my naps, as usual. My life as a Carmelite Secular has been thrown a wrench, a roadblock, a storm, a cloud with no sense of either its direction, or its end of annoyance in my little *Wadi*.

Of course, you may ask: "What the heck happened?" Simply put...the cancer in my prostate, after two years of monitoring decided it was time to express itself in a less than benign way it has been "with me" the past two years". My doctors have all been excellent. The Cancer Center in Eau Claire where I obtain my Radiology is considerate, well run, organized and has help for anything bothering me from: health, spiritual survival, understanding myself and cancer, even why I sleep so much with 14 treatments down and 14 more to go; five days a week, three more weeks. Now, I have developed some side effects. I'm lucky. So far my effects have been a lot of bathroom visits, anytime of the day or night! A little pain, here and there. Overall, I am satisfied, and still feel blessed in many ways.

So, [as Shakespeare would say...], here's the rub:

As Carmelites we should be more available to the driving force which sent our forbearers from the battleground of the Crusades to the Rock Cells of contemplation and prayer. Our ancestors, and as recently as we have seen in the works of past and present of our saints we can see the recurrence of the message, our message. We are called to an example of the Contemplative Life. Our call was not for our order being Friars. Our Rule was designed for Prayer, Praise, and Peace. The article recently regarding St. Titus really brought home our true vocation as People of the Way by being what we all were called to be. We are being called, and I believe we will always called to the charism of Prayer and Contemplation. The day of what habit to wear" How do the black stripes fit our move to Europe? "Do shoes count, or only Sandals? All of that ware and worry are not our call, our priority is the life of Prayer, not any other.

I'm hopeful this idea might be something which might encourage all of us Carmelites to look ahead. Engendering new ways of seeing our common vocation and common lives, our awareness of all we can do; our inheritance for the future of Carmel might just be growing to better understand our past.

Please pray for all of us! Well, or not. Smart, or not! But all of us in the House of Carmel!
